March Break Programs for Ages 6+

KINGSTON, ON – The Museum of Health Care is offering a wild, grossout ride through medical history for ages 6+ during March Break.

Every year the Museum offers a series of activities for children during their time off from school, and this year's theme is, well, disgusting.

Bloodletting, phlegm, black bile, and germs are just a few topics of exploration.

Upon arrival, children can expect to be outfitted with lab coats, learn about the four humors, explore the importance of germ control, see anatomical wax models known as medical moulages, sculpt human organs, and create their own medical

papyrus, just like they did in Ancient Egypt.

The Museum's Manager, Catherine Toews, designs and leads education and family programs at the Museum of Health Care. She finds that "this age group really responds well to icky medical facts. They like to gross out their friends."
